

Introduction: All jobsites should have some form of emergency plan. Depending on the work being done, these emergency plans can become a bit more complex. Emergencies can include fires, medical emergencies, traumatic injuries, entrapment or severe weather. Each jobsite creates new hazards each day, requiring changes be made to the emergency plan. Take time to review your emergency plan with all crewmembers on site. Provide training to members when required, to include confined space rescue.

JOBSITE EMERGENCY PLANNING

- What are emergencies that regularly occur on jobsites?
 - Fires on equipment or in a structure
 - Workplace violence, fights or threats
 - Severe weather
 - Entrapment in confined spaces
 - Personal medical emergency
 - Traumatic bodily injury
- Employees on the jobsite should know the following:
 - How to access 911 or know the local emergency phone number
 - The address of the jobsite
 - The names of first aid trained employees
 - Locations of first aid supplies
 - Locations of fire extinguishers
 - How to report incidents to company management
- Training can help prevent injuries and incidents and can also help minimize damage and improve care for injuries. Training needed for construction employees includes:
 - CPR training
 - First aid training
 - Bleeding control and tourniquet use
 - Confined space training to include proper and safe rescue of trapped persons
 - Emergency shutdown of machines
 - Where to take shelter during severe weather
 - Reacting safely to an overhead power line contact
 - Rescue of an employee that has fallen and is suspended by a personal fall arrest system
 - Know the location of Safety Data Sheets and how to respond to jobsite chemical incidents
- Check first aid kits often for missing or expired supplies.
- Make sure fire extinguishers are positioned at immediate reach whenever performing "hot work" on a jobsite.
- Have regular safety meetings to discuss incident & injury prevention, as well as potential jobsite emergencies.
- Make sure employees are working safely!
